Syracuse University EFC (Region II)

• The EFC facilitated the November 2014 meeting of the Vieques Sustainability Task Force, part of *President Obama's Task Force on Puerto Rico*. The Vieques Task Force is made up of community leaders, municipal representatives, the Puerto Rico Solid Waste Authority, private sector representatives, EPA, and other agencies. The Task Force seeks to advance sustainable economic development, job creation projects, and Superfund cleanup and remediation efforts. • The EFC registered eight new communities in the Sustainable Maryland Certified Program during the quarter. Sustainable Maryland is a free and voluntary certification program that helps Maryland communities choose a direction for their greening efforts. The program provides a framework to benchmark sustainability initiatives and facilitate community prioritization. Ten new communities achieved full certification in 2014 bringing the total number of such municipalities to in the program to 22. The practice guide evaluates a wide range of transportation options, their relationship to economic development and public support, and concludes that a well-balanced transportation system is one where individuals have multiple options for meeting their transportation needs.
