**EPA Region 9 Library – A Great Resource**: One of the gems of EPA Region 9 is the Environmental Information Center/Library. Located in a sunny spot on the 11<sup>th</sup> floor of 75 Hawthorne St. in San Francisco, the library has stacks chock-full of books, magazines and other research material. The collection is extensive, predating the founding of EPA in 1970. Services include reference, business background research and interlibrary loans.

Let's say you're a tribal environmental director trying to dig up a journal article on a thorny toxicological issue or an obscure treatise on an even more obscure environmental topic. Uh-oh! You discover that each publication is available only by subscription.

No worries! A librarian can get access to the document and email it to you. Or, if you're on the lookout for a book, you can ask your local library to send a request to the EPA library, and the book, if available, can be sent to your library.

Digitizing the collection is a priority, according to Head Librarian Kerry Shoji. Key digital research resources are the National Service Center for Environmental Publications, <a href="http://go.usa.gov/3WBvk">http://go.usa.gov/3WBvk</a>, and the EPA National Library Catalog, <a href="http://go.usa.gov/3WBdx">http://go.usa.gov/3WBdx</a>, which has shared databases that include historical information from the R9 library.

A large part of the library's original collection came from the regional offices of its predecessor agencies, such as the Federal Water Quality Administration, and the collection has a rich lode of primary-source environmental information. Examples are the following:

- o Draft and final county general plans
- Wastewater treatment planning documents
- Flood maps
- o Narrative reports of environmental issues
- Peripheral Canal, Bay Delta and California State Water Plan documents

FY15-FY16 Wetland Program Development Grants (\$3,151,750): EPA is requesting proposals from eligible applicants to build or refine state/tribal/local government wetland programs. Wetland programs should include at least one of the following elements: monitoring and assessment, wetland regulation, voluntary restoration and protection, and/or establishing water quality standards for wetlands. The request was published on April 8, 2015, in the Federal Register. The tribal consultation policy is meant to enhance communication and coordination between HUD and federally recognized Indian tribes. It is also intended to outline guiding principles and procedures used by HUD employees working with federally recognized tribes. Steering Committee Seeks New Members: The National Tribal Waste and Response Assistance Program is accepting applications from people interested in joining its steering committee. This committee has 10 tribal professionals who work in the areas of solid waste, brownfields, USTs, Superfund and emergency response. Committee members serve as an official Tribal Partnership Group, providing two-way communication with EPA's Office of Solid Waste and Emergency Response, as well as other federal agencies and tribal entities, communicating the needs and priorities of tribes.
