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An Expert System for Prediction of The Carcinogenic Potential of Chemicals

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### 1. Introduction To OncoLogic<sup>™</sup>

OncoLogic<sup>™</sup> is a unique expert system that predicts the potential carcinogenicity of chemicals by applying rules of structure activity relationship (SAR) analysis, and high level expert judgement that incorporates what is known about metabolism, mechanisms of action, and human epidemiological studies.

OncoLogic<sup>™</sup> is the only knowledge-based software developed in cooperation with the United States Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Structure Activity Team (SAT). These internationally recognized experts are responsible for evaluating the carcinogenic potential of all new chemicals developed in the United States or imported and intended to be marketed within the United States.

The goals of developing OncoLogic<sup>™</sup> were:

- to provide guidance to industries on elements of concern for developing safer chemicals,
- to provide a source of information to all interested parties on the rationale for identifying potential cancer hazard of chemicals,
- to provide a forum for reaching a common understanding among various regulatory agencies in hazard identification of chemical carcinogens, and
- to simulate research to fill knowledge gaps.

To accomplish these goals, the EPA experts, in cooperation with LogiChem Inc.,

developed "rule packages" which formalized current SAR knowledge based on data from

a variety of sources including:

- 'Chemical Induction of Cancer' Series (seven volumes) Academic Press (1968-1995) by J.C. Arcos, M.F. Argus, Y.-t. Woo, and D.Y. Lai.
- IARC Monographs
- NCI/NTP Bioassay Reports
- PHS Publication No. 149: 'Survey of Compounds Which Have Been Tested for Carcinogenic Activity'
- Non-confidential data and information from EPA files.

Since OncoLogic<sup>TM</sup> mimics the decision-making process used by the EPA during the Pre-Manufacture Notification (PMN) Process, you get the same evaluation the EPA experts would generate if they reviewed the chemical. A bioassay costs millions of dollars and takes several years to conduct. OncoLogic<sup>TM</sup> can provide information on the inherent hazard of a new chemical. This, combined with exposure information, gives you important insight as to whether this costly study will be recommended or required.

OncoLogic<sup>™</sup> has the ability to reveal its line of reasoning, just as human experts can. The user can enter information about the structure of a compound, obtain the assessment of the potential carcinogenicity, and then access the scientific line of reasoning used to arrive at the assessment outcome. This provides the user with a detailed explanation of a chemical's cancer causing potential.

Because OncoLogic<sup>™</sup> allows you to evaluate new chemicals early in their development, "go/no go" decisions can be reached before large investments are made. OncoLogic<sup>™</sup> provides a "window" to recognized expert thinking on a product before it is submitted for review. Therefore, OncoLogic<sup>™</sup> can save companies time and money. You can anticipate months, or even years, prior to a submittal if the compound will be approved or require a multi-million dollar bioassay. Because OncoLogic<sup>™</sup> has the ability to reveal its line of reasoning, it can assist in the development of safer alternative chemicals. You can also plan and design your testing strategically to reduce animal testing, and hence not only reduce the costs of research and development, but also minimize the adverse publicity associated with animal testing.

OncoLogic<sup>™</sup> can be used to evaluate the safety of existing chemicals. In the U. S. alone, an estimated 1,700,000 employees are exposed to chemicals in the workplace on an annual basis. There are 80,000 chemicals in use today. Of these, less than 2,000 have been tested for carcinogenic activity, and 64,000 have never been assessed for any health effects. OncoLogic<sup>TM</sup> can help evaluate the carcinogenic potential of these untested chemicals

OncoLogic<sup>™</sup> can be used strategically to examine process intermediates in alternative synthesis routes, to help select the safest manufacturing process. The program can evaluate chemical by-products that can introduce carcinogens into the work environment and the community beyond.


OncoLogic<sup>™</sup> consists of four major subsystems:

- Fibers
- Polymers
- Metals, Metalloids, and Metal containing compounds
- Organic chemicals

OncoLogic<sup>™</sup> can be used by individuals with a good understanding of organic chemical terminology. Minimum hardware requirements are: 386 computer operating under MS-DOS 5.0 or later, with 1 megabyte of RAM, 60 megabytes of fixed disk space, equipped with a mouse, a VGA board, and a color monitor.

## 2. Getting Started

The OncoLogic<sup>™</sup> expert system provides an interactive, user friendly interface that assumes the user to have a basic understanding of chemistry. The Fibers, Metals, and Polymers subsystems require the user to enter information about substances by selecting items from menus or entering data through data entry screens. The Organics subsystem allows the user to draw the molecule to be evaluated through the use of an uncomplicated, straightforward drawing package designed specifically for this program. The flow diagram below outlines the general structure of the system.



Across all subsystems, OncoLogic<sup>™</sup> provides information through the display of

advice and help screens. You can find the following information in this manual:

- 1. How to interpret the semantic terms used by OncoLogic<sup>™</sup> as they capture the thinking at the U.S. EPA.
- 2. How to use the various subsystems.
- 3. The hardware and software requirements.
- 4. How to use the menus, help screens, and data entry screens.
- 5. What information is provided in the reports.
- 6. A tutorial containing evaluations of previously selected compounds
- 7. How to use the report facility.

To run the OncoLogic<sup>TM</sup> program, you must first be sure that you are in the

ONCO directory, (C:\ONCO). The OncoLogic<sup>™</sup> system is then started by typing the

word "ONCO" at the system prompt. An OncoLogic<sup>™</sup> welcome screen will be displayed

## 3. Input Requirements

Each subsystem needs specific information about the compound before an

evaluation can be performed. Figure 2 contains a chart highlighting the types of

information needed to perform an evaluation for each subsystem.

#### 4. Output Produced

Once an evaluation has been performed, the OncoLogic<sup>™</sup> System produces reports explaining the carcinogenicity concern for the evaluated compound. There are two types of reports produced. One report is called a Justification report. This report contains a summary of the predicted concern level for the compound and the line of reasoning used by the expert system to arrive at the concern level. The other report is a Data report. This report restates the information the user entered upon which the evaluation was based. Examples of both types of reports can be found in the Tutorial section of this manual.

#### 4.1 Justification Report

The justification report consists of two parts: a summary of the evaluation and a line of reasoning (justification) of how the final conclusions were derived. Within the summary section, a final level of concern is stated along with any other messages that merit special attention. The concern levels used by the OncoLogic<sup>™</sup> system are semantic terms used by the U.S. EPA Structure Activity Team (SAT) for ranking the hazard levels of chemicals. The specific terms in order from highest concern to lowest concern are: HIGH, HIGH-MODERATE, MODERATE, LOW-MODERATE, MARGINAL, LOW. See Error! The line of reasoning part of the justification report keeps track of the rules that are used to arrive at a level of concern. The line of reasoning is specific to each evaluation and represents the actual rules used for the particular compound. The line of reasoning section also will draw attention to special considerations flagged for the compound, but in further detail than the summary section.

#### 4.2 Data Report

The data report contains the information that was entered about the compound. Essentially it becomes a reference report of the data entered upon which the OncoLogic<sup>™</sup> system based its evaluation.

## 5. Sub-system Specific Guides

#### 5.1 Introduction

Since OncoLogic<sup>™</sup> depends upon the classification of the compound to be evaluated, this guide has been developed, in part, to help you select the appropriate component to use for the evaluation. In it you will find the class of the compound (component), the type of evaluation available (database or expert system), and the basic skeleton templates upon which the compound can be defined. There are also two additional sections: one which tells you how to draw the compound with less detail and still get a valid evaluation (exceptions) and one which gives some additional information pertaining to the particular component (comments). All skeleton templates, substituent groups, heteroatoms, etc. are made available through pull down menus, and "point and click" methods.

The majority of the data entry screens and menus include context-sensitive help. Press the F1 key when ever you need additional information about a screen or menu. Press the Escape key to close the help window.

The databases contain the level of concern, assigned by the EPA carcinogenesis experts, based on SAR analysis and actual test data. You should first attempt to evaluate the compound in the database before evaluating it based on its structure (SAR analysis). In order to use the database, you will need the CAS number or name of the compound. In general, most menus have a menu item "Other" or "Z". This allows you to build a compound with an R group or a substituent that is not on one of the menus provided. If you choose to build such a structure, please note that the expert system does not contain rules for these non-specific groups and this adds a degree of uncertainty for the resulting level of concern. This is plainly noted in the justification report.

The User's Guide also contains some tips that apply to the entire OncoLogic<sup>™</sup> System. For a full tutorial on each system in OncoLogic<sup>™</sup>, refer the OncoLogic<sup>™</sup> User's Manuals.

#### 5.2 General Tips

When performing any evaluation, there is information which is always entered to reference the compound and reports that will be generated. The specific information which is needed is the filename and the substance identification.

- 1. The filename (Code Number) you are asked to enter is not the name of the compound. This is a unique name or number which is used to name the file that contains the evaluation information and is stored on the hard drive of the computer. This may any arbitrary name or number. This name or number should be significant to you or to the evaluation so you can retrieve the information at a later date. This filename is limited to 8 letters and/or numbers.
- 2. The name of the compound is entered in The Substance Identification Screen. The information is optional and does not affect the evaluation. It is simply used for reference purposes.

#### 5.2.1 Fiber, Metal and Polymer Systems:

Each of these systems have the same overall approach for performing an

evaluation. Information is entered through a sequence of screens and menus until all of

the requisite data has been reported. Once the information has been gathered, the

evaluation is performed and the two reports (data and justification) are generated. The

following features are available to each of these systems.

- 1. The <ESC> key is enabled to return the user to the previous screen or menu.
- 2. Help information is available for each screen by pressing the  $\langle F1 \rangle$  key.
- 3. Menu options can be quickly accessed by pressing the key of the highlighted letter of a specific menu option.

## 5.2.2 Organic System

The components contained in the Organic system obtain most of the needed

information through the use of a specialized drawing program. With the use of specific

skeleton templates, the you draw the compound to be evaluated. These systems also

include the features contained in the Fibers, Polymers, and Metals, and have the

following additional features.

- 1. For exposure questions, your selections are indicated by a check mark ( $\sqrt{}$ ). If exposure is not known, no selection is made.
- 2. During the drawing process, pressing the <Esc> key returns you to the menu bar, the previous pull down menu, exits a menu without making a selection, or to return to the previous screen.

## 5.2.3 Report Utility

- 1. To scroll the justification screen, press the PageUp/PageDown Key, use the mouse on the side scroll bar, or use the up/down arrow keys. The arrow keys must be pressed several times before the screen begins to scroll.
- 2. To view the R groups on the compound display, highlight the R group by placing the mouse over the "R", the press the left mouse key.

#### 5.3 Specific Organic Subsystem Tips

This section provides tips for each of the organic components. If you are having

trouble in an organic class, refer to subsection dealing with the organic class giving

problems.


#### 5.3.1 Acyl and Benzoyl Halide Type Compounds

Component: Acyl and Benzoyl Halides (direct-acting acylating agent)

Database: No

Expert System: Yes

**Skeleton Templates:** 



Substituents: None.

**Exceptions:** Substituents, such as sulfonic acid, hydroxyl, etc., are not considered when establishing a level of concern, nor are heteroatoms. Therefore these characteristics can not be placed on the alkyl or aryl R group. The degradation products of more complex R groups may be considered in other components and the higher concern level used. If the degradation products are not known then enter the alkyl/aryl group replacing the heteroatoms with carbon atoms.


#### 5.3.2 Acrylate Reactive Functional Groups

Component: Acrylates "esters of 2-propenic acid" (direct-acting alkylating agent)

Database: No

Expert System: Yes

**Skeleton Templates:** 



R1: aliphatic (alkyl chain) alicyclic (cycloaliphatic) aromatic (aromatic ring system 1-4 rings) normal body constituent (amino acid, purine, etc.) other types (H, benzyl, phenylethyl)

**Substituents:** The following substituents may be placed on alkyl R groups : hydroxyl (OH), carboxylic acid (COOH), sulfonic acid (SO3H), halogens (Cl, Br, I, F), and Other. In addition to these, aryl R group my have vinyl and allyl groups as well as alkyl (Cn) on aromatic rings. The ethylene moiety (C=C) may be substituted with the following: OH, COOH, SO3H, Cl, Br, I, F, Cn, Other, and cyano (CN).

**Exceptions:** Unsaturated alkyl chains, other than vinyl and allyl, are treated as saturated alkyl groups. Additional substituents, may not be added to alkyl chains of the ethylene moiety. Heteroatoms can not be replace the carbon atoms in the R1 alkyl chain nor can oxo groups be added. The degradation products of these compounds should be considered separately. If the degradation products are not known, replace the heteroatoms with carbon atoms.

**Comments:** The evaluation of any direct-acting alkylating agent considers 1 or more reactive functional group on a carrier molecule. The carrier molecule is considered to be the molecule to which the reactive group is attached. It may be aromatic, aliphatic, alicyclic, etc. It is important to remember that you are drawing the reactive functional group and not the entire molecule but its attachment to the carrier molecule must be considered. Refer to Section 51 for more details on Direct-Acting Alkylating Agents.


### 5.3.3 Acrylamide Reactive Functional Groups

Component: Acrylamides "amides of 2-propenoic acid" (direct-acting alkylating agent)

Database: No

Expert System: Yes

**Skeleton Templates:** 



**R1/R2:** aliphatic (alkyl chain) alicyclic (cycloaliphatic) aromatic (aromatic ring system 1-4 rings) normal body constituent (amino acid, purine, etc.) other types (H, benzyl, phenylethyl)

**Substituents:** The following substituents may be placed on alkyl R groups : hydroxyl (OH), carboxylic acid (COOH), sulfonic acid (SO3H), halogens (Cl, Br, I, F), and Other. In addition to these, aryl R group my have vinyl and allyl groups as well as alkyl (Cn) on aromatic rings. The ethylene moiety (C=C) may be substituted with the following: OH, COOH, SO3H, Cl, Br, I, F, Cn, Other, and cyano (CN).

**Exceptions:** Unsaturated alkyl chains, other than vinyl and allyl, are treated as saturated alkyl groups. Additional substituents, may not be added to alkyl chains of the ethylene moiety. Heteroatoms can not replace carbon atoms in the alkyl chain nor can oxo groups be added. The degradation products of these compounds should be considered separately. If the degradation products are not known, replace heteroatoms with carbon atoms.

**Comments:** The evaluation of any direct-acting alkylating agent considers 1 or more reactive functional group on a carrier molecule. The carrier molecule is considered to be the molecule to which the reactive group is attached. It may be aromatic, aliphatic, alicyclic, etc. It is important to remember that you are drawing the reactive functional group and not the entire molecule but its attachment to the carrier molecule must be considered. Refer to Section 50 for details on Direct-Acting Alkylating Agents.

## 5.3.4 Aflatoxin Type Compounds

Component: Aflatoxins and Microbial Toxins

Database: Yes

Expert System: No

Skeleton Templates: None.

**Exceptions:** Aflatoxins are a part of the coumarin & furocoumarin component. There are several aflatoxins in the database. Aflatoxins can not be evaluated by structure.


### 5.3.5 Aldehyde Type Compounds

Component: <u>Aldehyde</u>

Database: Yes

Expert System: Yes

**Skeleton Templates:** 



**R1:** aliphatic (alkyl chain) alicyclic (build as s-alkyl) aromatic (aromatic ring system 1-2 rings) other types (H, benzyl, phenylethyl, COOH, COO-, C(O)Cn, etc.)

**Substituents:** The following substituents may be placed on R1 groups: hydroxyl (OH), carboxylic acid (COOH), sulfonic acid (SO3H), halogens (Cl, Br, I, F), Other, and, additionally, alkyl (Cn) groups on aromatic rings.

**Exceptions:** Heteroatoms can not replace carbon atoms in the alkyl chain nor can oxo groups be added. The degradation products of these compounds should be considered separately. If the R group contains heteroatoms and degradation products are not known, replace the heteroatoms with carbon atoms.

**Comments:** Although aldehydes are direct-acting alkylating agents, they are evaluated without concern for additional RFGs on the molecule . See Section 51 for details on Direct Acting Alkylating Agents.


## 5.3.6 Aliphatic Azo and Azoxy Type Compounds

Component: <u>Aliphatic Azo & Azoxy</u>

Database: No

Expert System: Yes

**Skeleton Templates:** 



R1/R2: aliphatic (alkyl chain, cycloC6, vinyl, allyl) aromatic types (phenyl, benzyl, phenylethyl)

**Substituents:** Halogens (Cl, Br, I, F), cyano (CN), hydroxyl (OH), carboxylic acid (COOH), sulfonic acid (SO3H), alkoxy (OR), acyloxy(O(O)CR), and additionally, alkyl group (Cn) on alkyl groups.

**Exceptions:** Other than the vinyl and allyl R groups on the menu, other unsaturated aliphatic chain can not be drawn. When placing substituents on aromatic rings, select the group from the menu, then answer the number/position questions. When placing substituents on the alkyl R group, you will be asked to first construct the alkyl chain , then add the substituents. The chain must be at least 3 carbon atoms in length. If the R group is methyl or ethyl, select CH3 or C2H5. Heteroatoms can not replace carbon atoms in the alkyl chain nor can oxo groups be added. The degradation products of these compounds should be considered separately or the heteroatoms may be replaced with carbon atoms for the evaluation.

**Comments:** This earlier version of the build screen has substituents posted on the menu bar not in pull down menus as in later versions.


## 5.3.7 Alkanesulfonoxy Ester Type Compounds

Component: <u>Alkanesulfonoxy Esters</u>

Database: Yes

Expert System: Yes

**Skeleton Templates:** 



**R1:** aliphatic alkyl chain

**Substituents:** Substituents : carboxylic acid (COOH), sulfonic acid (SO3H), hydroxyl (OH), and halogens (Cl, Br, I, F) may be placed on the R1 group.

**Exceptions:** The substituents can only be placed on the R1 between the sulfonoxy groups. Double bonds be placed within the R1 group alkyl chain, however, keto groups C=O, can not be attached to the chain. Each Cn of the ester moiety must have the same number of carbons, also the aryl groups are the same. Aryl represents any aromatic ring system. The two carbons of R1 to which the sulfonoxy groups are attached must be defined.


## 5.3.8 Alkyl Sulfate and Alkyl Alkanesulfonate Type Compounds

Component: <u>Alkyl Sulfates and Alkyl Alkanesulfonates</u>

Database: No

Expert System: Yes

**Skeleton Templates:** 



**R1:** Alkyl Alkanesulfonate: aryl, phenyl, benzyl, phenylethyl, aliphatic alkyl chain and p-toluene. Alkyl Sulfate: aryl, phenyl, benzyl, phenylethyl, and aliphatic alkyl chain.

**R2:** Aryl, phenyl, benzyl, phenylethyl, aliphatic alkyl chain.

Substituents: None.

**Exceptions:** Substituents such as, COOH, SO3H, OH, and halogens, or heteroatoms are not considered in the evaluation and therefore can not be placed on the structure.


## 5.3.9 Aromatic Amine Type Compounds


**Component:** <u>Aromatic Amines</u>


Database: Limited to Heteroaromatic Compounds

Expert System: Yes

## **Skeleton Templates:**







**Substituents:** Hydroxyl (OH), carboxylic acid (COOH), sulfonic acid (SO3H), halogens (Cl, Br, I, F), cyano (CN), aldehyde (CHO), carbamoyl (C(O)NR2), carboxymethyl (COOCH3), Other, Alkyl, Hydroxyalkyl, Alkoxy.

## **Exceptions:**

**Questionnaire Screen:** Since there are so many different ring configurations for aromatic amine compounds, you are asked to enter the number of rings and answer a few general questions to define the basic skeleton template, a menu of skeletons, or the database to be used

**Heteroaromatic Skeletons:** The nitrogen atom can be replaced by O, S, NH, and in some cases As, Si, P, etc. There may be more than one nitrogen atom placed within the ring. The number and position of the heteroatoms vary but are limited to maintain the aromaticity of the structure.

**Linked Skeletons:** The linkage, designated by "Y" may be defined with one of 18 different linkages. Only the configurations shown can be evaluated.

**Fused, Linear and Nonlinear, Homocyclic, Aromatic Structures with 3-6 Rings:** Several configurations of skeleton templates are available.

Linked and Fused, Heterocyclic, Aromatic Structures with 3-6 Rings: These compounds can be evaluated only through the database.

**Substituents:** Ring substituents can be selected from menus and include alkyl chains, hydroxyl, carboxylic acid, sulfonic acid, cyano, etc. If the ring substituent is an alkyl group with a substituent, CH2F for example, the F is treated as a hydrogen and can not be explicitly drawn. Also, a menu of nitrogen-containing groups such as NO, NH2, NR1R2 where R1 and R2 are alkyl or aryl, is provided; at least one must be placed on the ring system.


## 5.3.10 Anhydride Type Compounds

**Component:** <u>Anhydrides (direct-acting acylating agent)</u>

Database: No

Expert System: Yes

**Skeleton Templates:** 



**Ring Substituents:** Ring substituents, alkyl groups (Cn), halogens (Cl, Br, I, F), hydroxyl (OH), carboxylic acid (COOH), and sulfonic acid (SO3H) may be added to the ring carbons.

**Exceptions:** Substituents may not be added to the alkyl ring substituents. Heteroatoms may not replace ring carbon atoms.


## 5.3.11 Arylazo Type Compounds

Component: Arylazo Compounds

Database: Yes

Expert System: Uses Aromatics Amines

**Skeleton Templates:** 



**Exceptions:** The "By Structure" evaluation is carried out in the aromatic amine component. When on of the above skeleton templates is selected, a description of the resulting compounds is given with instructions to evaluate the products in the aromatic amine component.

**Comments:** The following may be used to find a compound in the arylazo database: CI Number, CI Name, Non CI Name, and CAS Number.


## 5.3.12 Aryldiazonium Salts

Component: <u>Aryldiazonium Salts (direct-acting arylating agent)</u>

Database: No

Select the **phosphate-type** skeleton to view 12 additional skeletons. In this generic skeleton R1/R2/R3 stand for, alkyl groups, or aryl groups attached directly to the phosphorus (P), and , X-alkyl or X-aryl where X is oxygen, sulfur or in some cases nitrogen, linking the phosphorus to the alkyl/aryl group. The following types of organophosphates and related compounds are represented: phosphates, phosphonates,

phosphorothioates, phosphorothiolates, phosphorodithioates, phosphoroamidates, phosphoramides.

Select the **phosphine-type** skeleton to view 2 skeletons: phosphine and phosphine-oxide.

Select the **cyclophosphamide-type** skeleton to view 3 skeletons: cyclophosphamide, isophosphamide, trophosphamide.

**R1/R2/R3:** alkyl (Cn), hydrogen (H), benzyl (CH2C6H5), phenyl (C6H5), Morpholino, NR'R" (where R'R" can be one of the above).

**X1/X2/X3/X4:** Oxygen (O), Sulfur (S)

**Substituents:** Halogens (Cl, Br, I, F), hydroxyl (OH), carboxylic acid (COOH), sulfonic acid (SO3H) and additionally alkyl (Cn) on the aryl ring..

**Exceptions:** In addition to oxygen and sulfur, nitrogen (N) is commonly found in organophosphorus-type compounds. For these types of compounds, the nitrogen heteroatom has been appropriately placed in the skeleton.

The "Other" menu selection, found in most other systems is not offered in this system.

To evaluate di/tri organophosphates, not found in the database, evaluate each degradation product and use the highest concern level for the final concern.

Additional heteroatoms in the alkyl R groups may be entered as carbon atoms or the degradation product may be evaluated separately.

**Comments:** Phosphoramides and certain phosphorus-containing nitrogen mustards (e.g. cyclophosphamides) my require metabolic activation to alkylating intermediates. Most other alkyl phosphates, i.e. phosphates-type organophosphorsus compounds, are direct acting alkylating agents.

# 6. Direct-Acting Alkylating Agents - A Guided Tour

The Direct-acting Alkylating Agents Component of the Organic Subsystem

evaluates alkylating agents which do not require metabolic activation to exert

carcinogenic action. Some molecules are unlikely to have more than on direct-acting

alkylating agent are refereed to as stand-alone compounds, whereas others more

commonly have more than one reactive functional groups (RFGs) of the same or of

different types. The carcinogenicity concern is first determine for each of the RFGs; the

concern for the entire molecule is determined by the combination of RFGs.

## 6.1 Stand-alone Compounds

The direct-acting alkylating agents that are stand-alone compounds are listed

below:

- Aldehydes
- Alkyl and Alkenyl Halides (Halogenated Linear Aliphatics)
- Alkyl Phosphates (most Organophosphate Compounds)
- Alkyl Sulfates and Alkyl Alkanesulfonates
- Dicarbonyls

These compounds are all evaluated by either selecting the compound from a database or building the compound by selecting the appropriate skeleton of the compound and adding substituents, etc. to the skeleton. For more information about each type of direct-acting alkylating agent that is a stand-alone compound, refer the 'User's Guide to the Organic Subsystem'.

## 6.2 Reactive Functional Groups

The direct-acting alkylating agents that are reactive functional groups are listed

below:

- Acrylamides

- Acrylates
- Epoxides
- Ethyleneimines
- alpha-Haloalkylamines
- alpha-/beta-Haloethers
- alpha-Halothioethers
- Ketones, Reactive
- Lactones
- Nitrogen Mustards
- Sulfones, Reactive
- Sulfur Mustards
- Sultones

These RFGs must be attached to some type of carrier molecule to form the compound to be evaluated. A carrier molecule is used to refer to the entire compound minus the specific reactive functional group being evaluated. The compound can be monofunctional, meaning there is only one RFG attached to the carrier molecule, or polyfunctional, meaning there is more than one RFG attached to the carrier molecule. In either case, general information about the compound must be entered and both the RFG(s) and the corresponding carrier molecule must be defined.

## 7. Steps For Evaluating an RFG

The following are step-by-step instructions for evaluating one or more RFGs attached to a carrier molecule.

#### 7.1 Step 1

First, one or more questions about the compound as a whole are asked. The questions displayed are dependent upon the previous answers. These questions pertain to the bioavailability of the compound, the molecular weight of the compound, the RFG equivalent weight, the presence of covalently linked repeating subunits, and the

anticipated route or routes of exposure of the compound. Simply answer the questions presented. If you need clarification, help is available by pressing the F1 key.

### 7.2 Step 2

If the RFG is an acrylamide, acrylate, alpha-halothioether, or sulfur mustard, the RFG skeleton is known and will be displayed directly on the screen.

If the RFG is not one of the aforementioned, a menu of RFG skeletons is displayed and the appropriate skeleton must be selected from the menu.

Remember, the skeleton represent the one RFG that you are evaluating at this time. You will be able to evaluate all RFGs during this session. The R1/R2 groups represent the "carrier molecule" which you will also have the opportunity to describe in general terms.

#### 7.3 Step 3

Once the skeleton of the RFG has been chosen, the "carrier molecule" must be defined and substituents may be added to the atoms which make up the RFG skeleton. These can be defined in any order. The "carrier molecule" selections can be found under the 'R-groups/Substituents' option under the 'Add' menu. The possibilities for the "carrier molecule" include: Aliphatic, Aromatic, Alicyclic, Normal body constituents and Other groups. Look at the selections available under each. Press the Escape key to leave the menu without selecting an item. The last option offered on the 'R-groups/Substituents' menu is Substituents. The items from the 'Substituent' menu can only be placed on atoms that make the RFG skeleton; they can not be used to define the carrier molecule, which is denoted as R1 and/or R2.

When defining the "carrier molecule", the remaining RFGs can be defined as simple substituents. To do this simply indicate the RFG with "Other" or as an alkyl chain, which ever is more representative. Remember, you will have the opportunity to completely define this RFG later in the evaluation.

#### 7.4 Step 4

When this RFG and the "carrier molecule" has been completely defined, select the 'Exit' option from the main menu and the 'Evaluate Compound' option from the 'Exit' menu. The final level of concern for this RFG will then be established.

#### 7.5 Step 5

If there is another RFG attached to the compound that needs to be evaluated, then enter another code number (filename) for the evaluation of that RFG, select the type of RFG from the menu, and repeat Step 2 - Step 4.

If each RFG has been evaluated and the compound is monofunctional, then the final level of concern for the compound is displayed and the evaluation ends.

If each RFG has been evaluated and the compound is polyfunctional, enter a unique code name for the overall line of reasoning. Then, if asked, answer the questions regarding the distance between each pair of RFGs. Once all the information has been supplied, the final level of concern for the compound is displayed and the evaluation ends.

Keep a record of the code numbers (filenames) used for each RFG evaluated. These code numbers are referred to in the final justification report. In addition to the final report, you can view (or print) the justification report for each RFG through the report utility. Select the Reports from the Main Menu, then select the code number (filename) from the displayed list.

### 8. Tutorials

This section provides step by step tutorials for various subsystems of the OncoLogic<sup>™</sup> program in order that the user might become familiar with the basic approach for performing an evaluation. The samples include a polymer, a metal, a fiber, and an organic. The examples should be robust enough for the user to get a feel for how to perform an evaluation in any of the OncoLogic<sup>™</sup> subsystems. If you are having difficulty with a particular subsystem, refer to the General Tips on page 14.

Each sample session begins with an "Information Summary". The questions asked by OncoLogic<sup>™</sup> can be answered by entering the information in the summary. Each sample evaluation will begin from the main menu of options.






General Input Flow Diagram for aromatic amine example.


Because we do not have the name or CAS number for the compound, we will **select 'BY STRUCTURE'**. However, if the CAS number or name had been known, use of the database would have been the first course of action.




As you will see, there are now four more options which can be selected. We will **highlight Substituents** and **click** the mouse button.




From here we will **highlight and select -OCH**<sub>3</sub> by clicking the mouse button in order to add the substituent to the ring structure.




Since we have no other methoxy substituents to add to the compound. We will now **select Amine Generating Groups** from the menu.



**Select:** -NO<sub>2</sub> by **highlighting** the group and **clicking** the mouse button or pressing







is determined by considering the number of rings, the presence or absence of heteroatoms in the rings; the number and position of amino groups; the nature, number and position of other nitrogencontaining 'amine-generating groups'; and the type, number and position of additional substituents. Aromatic amine compounds are expected to be metabolized to N-hydroxylated/N-acetylated derivatives which are subject to further bioactivation, producing electrophilic reactive intermediates that are capable of interaction with cellular nucleophiles (such as DNA) to initiate carcinogenesis. Nitro groups of aryl compounds can be reduced by nitro reductase to amino groups yielding aromatic amine compounds. The evaluation of this compound proceeds as if the nitro group were a free amine group. An aromatic compound containing one benzene ring, one amino group, and one methyl or methoxy group ortho- to the amino group, has a carcinogenicity concern of HIGH-MODERATE. The additional chloro and/or bromo group(s) generally raise(s) the level of concern, but they also impose an upper limit of HIGH-MODERATE on the concern level of the compound. Therefore, the level of concern remains HIGH-MODERATE. The final level of carcinogenicity concern for this compound is HIGH-MODERATE.
