What is Environmental Justice?

The fair treatment and meaningful involvement of all people regardless of race, color, national origin, or income with respect to the development, implementation, and enforcement of environmental laws and policies.

Environmental injustice is...

When a community suffers disproportionately from environmental risks or hazards

Why is EJ Important?

- Research shows that certain communities have been historically disproportionately burdened
- Equal protection for all people under the national environmental laws
- Creates environment where communities can effectively coexist
- Allows for public participation in government decisionmaking

Why is EJ Important? (Cont.)

EJ communities typically lack access to health care, supermarkets, and recreational facilities







- Using science as the backbone of regulatory decisions


