

Workgroup Objectives

- Provide recommendations and feedback to EPA on it's long-term goal of developing an electronic incident data system that is publically-available and useful to a broad stakeholder group
- In near term, the focus will be developing recommendation on data elements



Importance

- OPP relies on incident data for:
 - Risk assessments
 - Risk management decisions
 - Rule making
 - Priority areas
- The PPDC feedback will be important in OPP's efforts to improve incident data quality and management
- Creating an incident data system that is easy to use, has standard data elements, and is accessible and useful to a broad stakeholder group will make it more likely to be used (could increase the number of voluntary incidents we receive)
