RE: Adequacy Status of Imperial 8-hour Ozone Early Progress Plan Motor Vehicle Emissions Budgets

Dear Mr. Goldstene:

We have found adequate for transportation conformity purposes the motor vehicle emissions budgets (MVEBs) in the *Imperial County 8-hour Ozone Early Progress Plan* (February 2008). As a result of our adequacy findings, the Southern California Association of Governments and the U.S. Department of Transportation must use these budgets in future conformity analyses once the finding becomes effective.

The California Air Resources Board (CARB) submitted the draft *Imperial County 8-hour Ozone Early Progress Plan* to EPA for parallel processing on February 6, 2008 as a revision to the California State Implementation Plan (SIP). The plan identifies regional MVEBs for the nonattainment area for volatile organic compounds (VOCs) and nitrogen oxides (NOx) for the year 2009. We announced receipt of the plan on EPA's website on February 14, 2008, and requested public comment by March 17, 2008. We did not receive any comments on the budgets and plan during that comment period. CARB formally adopted the plan without amendment on February 28, 2008, and submitted the final version to EPA on March 24, 2008.

This letter transmits our decision that the motor vehicle emissions budgets contained in the *Imperial County 8-hour Ozone Early Progress Plan* are adequate for transportation conformity decisions. The plan identifies regional motor vehicle emission budgets in the table below:

¹ The plan uses a comparable State term, reactive organic gases (ROG).
