Dear Kimberly:

I am writing to supplement the email I sent you Monday regarding the after-acquired trust lands issue. What I omitted from Monday's email, but which I alluded to and which we think is important for EPA to consider, are EPA-approved tribal water quality standards that appear to automatically apply to water bodies on after-acquired trust lands. Specifically, I was referring to EPA's approved Water Quality Standards of the Port Gamble S'Klallam Tribe, which define "Reservation" as "all lands and tidelands acquired for the use and benefit of the Port Gamble S'Klallam Tribe, as set forth by Secretary of Interior Proclamation on June 16, 1938 and such other lands as are now or may be designated in the future as Port Gamble S'Klallam reservation land by the United States" [emphasis added] and EPA's approved Water Quality Standards of the Bishop Paiute Tribe, which define "tribal land" as "all lands in trust for the benefit of the Bishop Paiute Tribe or lands held in fee status owned by the Bishop Paiute Tribe, including those lands obtained for or by the Tribe hereafter." [emphasis added]. For the reasons set forth in my email and because it would appear to be consistent with at least EPA's two previous tribal water quality standards approvals cited above, we are hoping

EPA will not require reapplications whenever the United States acquires new land into trust for the Tribe's benefit. Before submitting its application, the Tribe discussed with EPA the approach of limiting the Tribe's TAS application to trust lands and we received no indication that additional applications would be required for later-acquired trust land.

We hope this information is helpful as you and your colleagues consider the afteracquired trust lands issue.
