## FY19 Summary of the Brownfields Assessment and Cleanup Grant Guidelines Changes (as of 11/28/18)

The **Brownfields Utilization, Investment and Local Development (BUILD) Act** was enacted in March 2018 as part of the FY 2018 Consolidated Appropriations Act. The BUILD Act reauthorized EPA's Brownfields Program and made changes that affect the grant programs, and ownership and CERCLA liability. Program changes include:

- Expanded eligibility for nonprofit organizations that are 501(c)(3) and certain limited liability corporations to receive Assessment and RLF Grants.
- Increased funding for Cleanup Grants from up to \$200,00 per site to up to \$500,000 per site.
- Established a Multipurpose Grant for brownfields planning, inventory, characterization, and remediation activities; up to \$800,000 per grant.
- Added new statutory evaluation criteria the extent to which the grant will:
  - o address a site adjacent to body of water or in a federally-designated flood plain,
  - facilitate location of a facility generating renewable electricity from wind/solar/geothermal, or any energy efficiency improvement project at a brownfield site.
- Removed Administrative Cost Prohibition; recipients may use up to 5% of the amount of EPA funding on administrative costs.

The BUILD Act also includes amendments to site ownership and liability requirements:

- Clarified the types of state and local government acquisitions that are exempt from CERCLA liability if the government did not cause or contribute to the contamination. Added acquisitions "through seizure or otherwise in connection with law enforcement activity" as included in the statutory exemption and removed the requirement that state and local governments show that the government's acquisition was "involuntary."
- Excluded Alaska Native Village Corporations and Alaska Native Regional Corporations and certain successors in interest from the CERCLA definition of "owner or operator" as long as they did not cause or contribute to the contamination in cases where property was conveyed from U.S. government under the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act.
- Removed requirement that petroleum sites be of "relatively low risk, as compared with other petroleum-only sites in the State" to be eligible for Brownfields Grant funding.
- Codified a provision that publicly owned brownfield sites (for example, sites owned by government entities) are eligible for grant funds for property acquired prior to January 11, 2002, as long as the entity did not cause or contribute to the contamination.
- Revises the definition of a bona fide prospective purchaser (BFPP) to include those who acquire a leasehold interest in a property and meet certain criteria.

Applicants applying for a **Multipurpose Grant** are <u>not</u> eligible to apply for an Assessment Grant or Cleanup Grant in the same competition year. This document does not include information on the Multipurpose Grant. Please refer to the Multipurpose Grant Guidelines for more information.

A solicitation for new **Revolving Loan Fund Grants** will not be issued in FY 2019. EPA expects to solicit requests from existing, high-performing RLF Grant recipients supplemental funding through a Federal Register notice in early 2019.
