Biography: Keith Sargent has been an economist at the National Center for Environmental Economics at the U.S. EPA since 1988. He undertakes and reviews economic analyses on the impacts of air quality regulations, including examining employment impacts from regulations on the energy sector. He also has primary responsibility for supporting web-communications on the operations of the Center and the uses of economic analysis at the Agency on the [Environmental Economics](#) website. He worked on a detail assignment to the Evaluation and Support Division in the policy office in 2009. Prior to joining the Agency, he served as a visiting assistant professor in the economics department at the University of New Hampshire (1987-1988). He completed his PhD in economics at Iowa State University in 1997.
