

Brett Snyder, Division Director in EPA's [National Center for Environmental Economics](#)

Current Research Interests: Agency guidance on the use of economic tools; Benefit-cost analysis; Economic impacts on small businesses and state/local governments.

Biography: Brett Snyder has been an economist at the National Center for Environmental Economics at the U.S. EPA since 1986. He primarily focuses on administrative (contracts and grants management, budget) and human resources-related operations of the Center while serving as a first-line supervisor for one of the two divisions in the Center (Benefits Assessment and Methods Development Division – 1994 to present). Prior to his supervisory position, Brett worked as a staff economist in the predecessor organizations to the Center (1986-1994). Prior to joining the Agency, he worked as a consultant (1983-1986) for the original office (Benefits Staff) established to enhance the Agency's capacity to produce benefit-cost analyses, pursuant to requirements contained in the Reagan Administration's [Executive Order 12291](#) (1981) on federal regulatory reviews and increased use of economic analysis. He earned his MS degree in agricultural and resource economics from the University of Maryland-College Park (1983) and a BS in economics from the College of William and Mary in Virginia (1980).
