NWI Partners Certified Paddlesports Safety Facilitators

On May 31st NWI Urban Waters and the National Park Service held an American Canoe Association Paddlesports Safety Facilitator class with funding

from USFS. 25 partners representing NPS, EPA, the Northwest Indiana Paddling Association, Shirley Heinze Land Trust, and the Miller Citizens Corp Shoreline Water Safety Committee earned certification. On June 12, NPS hosted a Level 2 Canoe and Level 2 Kayak training. The trainings will build capacity for partners to utilize the many canoe and kayak launches installed across NWI in recent years to safely connect our communities to their waterways.

Indiana Tree Stewards

Congratulations to 24 participants who participated in the Indiana DNR Tree Steward training on June 10-11 in Portage, Indiana. Participants learned about the basics of urban tree care and how to communicate the benefits of urban trees. To become certified Tree Stewards, participants must pass a written exam and complete 15 hours of volunteer service to improve or maintain the urban forest. Indiana Master Watershed Steward

More than a dozen interns participated in the pilot of the Indiana Master Watershed Steward program. The program was developed by Illinois-Indiana Sea Grant with help from many NWI Urban Waters partners. Participants completed 12 weeks of training this spring culminating in a

Funding Opportunities

Great Lakes Restoration Initiative (GLRI)

Through an agreement with the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Forest Service anticipates that up to \$4.1 million in new funds will be available for tree planting and forest health improvement in the Great Lakes Basin.

*Applications due Friday, June 28th

*Award range: \$50,000 to \$350,000 with 20% non-Federal match

Bank of America Charitable Foundation Economic Grants

Funding is available in the "Economic Mobility and Social Progress Focused on the Needs of the Community" category, which provides support for affordable housing, sustainable development, strong business corridors, the arts and environmental investments. Support is provided for equitable solutions that will help vulnerable communities grow and prosper.

*Applications due June 28, 2019

*Funding generally ranges from \$2,500 to \$50,000.

RTCA Community Assistance

National Park Service staff provide free, on-location facilitation and planning expertise. We draw from project experiences across the country and adapt best practices to a community's specific needs. Project applicants may be state and local agencies, tribes, nonprofit organizations, or citizen groups. *Applications due June 30

NRCS Conservation Innovation On-Farm Conservation Innovation Trials

The purpose of On-Farm Trials is to stimulate the adoption and evaluation of innovative conservation approaches in partnership with agricultural producers. NRCS is implementing On-Farm Trials through eligible entities, which in turn work collaboratively with NRCS and agricultural producers to implement innovative approaches on private lands.

*Applications due July 15

*Award Range: \$250,000 - \$500,000

GLRI Nonpoint Source Projects to Address Agricultural Nutrients and Stormwater Runoff

EPA expects to award a total of approximately \$14 million for about 30 nonpoint source projects addressing agricultural nutrients and stormwater runoff. Categories include: Green infrastructure to reduce stormwater runoff; Manure management to reduce nutrient runoff from farms; accelerating adoption of nutrient management through farmer-led outreach and education; and water quality trading and market-based approaches for nutrient reduction. *Applications due July 12, 2019

Groundwork USA-Technical Assistance

Groundwork USA, in partnership with NPS and EPA, is accepting letters of interest from communities wishing to apply for Groundwork USA program funding and technical assistance. The selected community will be eligible for up to \$200,000 in funding and technical assistance to plan, establish and build the capacity of a Groundwork Trust organization in their community. *Letters of interest due July 31, 2019

Great Lakes Emerging Champions Mini-Grant Program

Great Lakes Emerging Champions Mini-Grants are intended to increase green infrastructure (GI) implementation capacity in small to mid-sized communities in the Great Lakes Basin. Grants support community projects that focus on developing strategies to overcome key institutional barriers to implementing GI in communities.

*Applications due July 31st, 2019
