The Five Star and Urban Waters Restoration Grant Program

The program seeks to develop community capacity to sustain local natural resources for future generations by providing modest financial assistance to diverse local partnerships focused on improving water quality, watersheds, and the species and

habitats they support.

Potential projects include a variety of ecological improvements along with targeted community outreach, education and stewardship. Ecological improvements may include one or more of the following: wetland, riparian, forest and coastal habitat restoration; wildlife conservation, community tree canopy enhancement, water quality monitoring and green infrastructure best management practices for managing run-off. Projects should also increase access to the benefits of nature, reduce the impact of environmental hazards and engage local communities, particularly underserved communities, in project planning, outreach, and implementation.

Great Lakes Fish and Wildlife Restoration Act (GLFWRA)

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is accepting project proposals to protect, restore and enhance Great Lakes fish and wildlife habitat under the Great Lakes Fish and Wildlife Restoration Act (Act). The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service requests interested entities to submit restoration, research and Regional project proposals for the restoration of Great Lakes fish and wildlife resources.

The six goals of the Act are:

- 1. Restoring and maintaining self-sustaining fish and wildlife resources.
- 2. Minimizing the impacts of contaminants on fishery and wildlife resources.
- 3. Protecting, maintaining, and, where degraded and destroyed, restoring fish and wildlife habitat, including the enhancement and creation of wetlands that result in a net gain in the amount of those habitats.
- 4. Stopping illegal activities adversely impacting fishery and wildlife resources.
- 5. Restoring threatened and endangered species to viable, self-sustaining levels.
- 6. Protecting, managing, and conserving migratory birds.

*Award Range: \$2,300 - \$2 million

DHS FEMA FY 2018 Pre-Disaster Mitigation

The Pre-Disaster Mitigation (PDM) program makes available Federal funds to State, Local and Tribal Governments to implement and sustain cost-effective measures designed to reduce the risk to individuals and property from natural hazards, while also reducing reliance on Federal funding from future disasters.

*Applications due January 31, 2019

DHS FEMA FY 2018 Flood Mitigation Assistance

The Flood Mitigation Assistance (FMA) Program makes available Federal funds to State, Local and Tribal Governments to reduce or eliminate the risk of repetitive flood damage to buildings and structures insured under the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP).

*Applications Due: January 31, 2019

2019 Healthy Watersheds Consortium Grant Program RFP

The primary focus for applicants should be protection and stewardship of land in the watershed, not restoration of degraded habitats or projects with a strictly water quality improvement outcome.

*Award Range \$50,000 - \$250,000

*Applications due February 1, 2019

The Northwest Indiana Urban Waters Partnership focuses on the Lake Michigan watershed in Lake, LaPorte and Porter Counties, Indiana.

Urban Waters works to connect urban communities, particularly those that are overburdened or economically distressed, with their waterways by improving coordination among federal agencies and state and local partners. The goals are to improve the Nation's water systems and to promote their economic, environmental and social benefits.
