MS. WONG: We will start with the public hearing process. So those of you who are in the back, if you could please take a seat. Thank you. So we're ready. Okay. Great.

So the next part of our public meeting and public hearing process tonight is our formal public hearing and Arlene today is our public hearing officer and she will begin in a short while with the opening statement by EPA. So at this time, we have a sheet where all of you who are interested in signing up, what we will be doing is Arlene will be reading your name on the list and I would ask you to come up.

We will have our court reporter, Peggy Smith, transcribe everything that you're saying to us tonight. So please speak slowly into the mic here. Take your time and please again state your name when you step up so that we make sure we have your name down on the record.

If you do want to sign up and you haven't signed up already to make a comment, John Moody over there -- please raise your hands -- he will be putting you on the list. So please just flag him down and he will put you on the list to make comments and just to remind you, we have alternate opportunities for you to give us your public comments outside of this meeting and we have another meeting tomorrow at the Gila River Indian Community, District 4

Service Center. So we have a similar meeting and another hearing from 6 to 9:00 p.m.

So you are all welcome to also attend that meeting and give us your comments then and if you want to, you can always e-mail, fax or call Cheryl Nelson with your comments and we have a comment form that we gave out to you when you entered the meeting today and if you need one please flag me down and you just write onto that comment form and mail it to us.

Again, the deadline for the comments is

October 9th. So looking forward to getting more comments

from you. So the EPA -- I just want to remind everyone -will not be responding. So the process that we are taking
is we will hear from you. This is the purpose of the
hearing. We want to hear from you, the public and
community, about our intent to deny the Romic facility
permit. So we will unfortunately not be able to respond to
you. We will be responding later with a written response.

So without further delay, I would like to introduce again Arlene Kabei, our public hearing officer. She will be reading from an opening statement by EPA and we will start the process, the formal process of the public hearing.

MS. KABEI: Thank you, Pui Man, and before I open the public meeting officially I did want to ask for your

indulgence a bit. For those of you that have never been to a formal public hearing put on by the agency, it is a very, very formal process and for that reason, I must read the statements so that it is recorded into the record.

As part of that statement, there's going to be a lot of repetition, a lot to what Cheryl has already spoken to and some of the responses by Michael. So in that sense I apologize in advance for the repetition, but that is part of the formality here. So if you will indulge me with that, I appreciate it. So by my clock, it is now 7:32 and this public hearing is now open.

My name is Arlene Kabei and I am the Associate

Director of the Waste Management Division for the U.S.

Environmental Protection Agency in San Francisco,

California. I will be presiding over this public hearing.

The purpose of this hearing is to formally hear public

comment on EPA's intent to deny a hazardous waste permit for

the Romic Technologies Corporation Southwest facility

located at 6760 West Allison Street within the Gila River

Indian Community.

By way of background on this facility, the Romic facility has been in existence since 1975 when it was operated by Southwest Solvents. Romic purchased the facility in 1988 and has operated since that time as a hazardous waste storage and treatment facility that

primarily recycles solvent waste.

Federal regulations requiring a permit for Romic's hazardous waste activities were promulgated in 1980, well after the facility had begun its operations. In such cases, facilities can acquire what we call interim status which allows them to continue operations until EPA makes a final permanent decision. Under interim status, facilities must comply with extensive regulations designed to protect human health and the environment.

Romic submitted a final permit application to EPA in February of 2005 requesting a ten year permit to continue to treat and store hazardous waste. EPA has reviewed Romic's permit application. EPA is proposing now to deny Romic's permit application because the application is lacking a landowner's signature and certification as required by regulation.

Owners, that is including landowners and operators of hazardous waste facilities, are jointly responsible for complying with the hazardous waste regulations. Therefore, our regulations require that both landowners as well as the operators sign and certify the permit application. The Gila River Indian Community is the landowner for the Romic facility. GRIC must also sign and certify Romic's application in order for the application to be considered complete.

Romic's final revised part B permanent application submitted in February 2005 lacked a signature from the GRIC as a landowner. EPA has had numerous formal and informal discussions with Romic and representatives from GRIC regarding the need for the landowner signature. On June 20th, 2007, the GRIC Community Council unanimously passed the resolution disapproving of Romic Environmental Technology's Part B application, EPA application.

Because GRIC has voted to not sign Romic's permit application as the landowner, EPA is proposing to deny the permit application because it is incomplete. Because the landowner signature for Romic's permit application has not been provided, we are now authorized to initiate our permit denial proceedings. Public notice of this hearing and of the commencement of the public comment period for this action was given on August 24, 2007 by EPA's publication in the East Valley Tribune, Chandler Republic and the Casa Grande Dispatch.

Also on September 4th, 2007, EPA mailed a Fact Sheet to approximately 330 people on the Romic facility mailing list, 700 copies to Gila River Indian Community Department of Environmental Quality for distribution to their membership and 300 copies to the City of Chandler for distribution. The 45 day comment period for this decision runs from August 24 until October 9, 2007.

The purpose of this portion of the hearing now is to hear -- for us to listen to your comments and concerns. And as has been emphasized many times already tonight, we will not and cannot and should not comment in response to your statements. Principally, that's because the Agency decisions are made by a number of people in our organization and we who are here tonight, even though we represent EPA, are not the only ones authorized to commit the Agency's decision to a final permit.

After the conclusion of the public comment period, EPA will prepare a Response to Comments document that will list all the comments that we have received and our responses. That document will also include our final permit decision. That document will also become part of the administrative record.

EPA will also accept written comments beyond this evening and these will be considered along with the statements made at this hearing. You may hand in written comments at this hearing on the form provided, if you prefer not to speak. You may also submit your written comments to EPA at the address listed on the Fact Sheet. Please submit your comments to EPA by October 9, 2007 in order for them to be fully considered.

The administrative record for the proposed permit denial consists of the proposed Statement of Basis, a Fact

Sheet, a public notice, relevant public documents considered in the preparation of the Statement of Basis, comments received during the public comment period and the transcript of testimony received and being recorded now at this public hearing.

The complete administrative record will be available at EPA's office in San Francisco. Copies of the proposed decision and other documents are also available at the GRIC Department of the Environmental Quality in Sacaton, Arizona.

This brings to a conclusion my formal statements and opening the minutes. So I want to make sure that everyone that wants to make comments, will do so tonight.

So I'm going to turn that over to PuiMan.

MS. WONG: At this time, I will read from a list of the sign-up sheet for those of you who have signed up to make a comment. So as I read your name, please step up to the podium and to the mic and again repeat your name and if you have an organization that you are representing, please state that and please speak slowly so that our court reporter can record all your comments. So the first one we have on the list is I invite Bradley Angel. Please step up to the mic.

MR. ANGEL: Good evening. My name is Bradley
Angel and I'm the Executive Director of Greenaction for

Health and Environmental Justice. I'm speaking tonight and Greenaction has been involved in this issue directly at the request of Gila River Indian Community members, Greenaction members, as well as Chandler and Phoenix residents, as well.

We're here to say that we applaud the decision of the U.S. EPA and their Notice of Intent to Deny this permit. This is not just the right thing to do. It is not just the ethical thing to do, because it is both of those. It's not just morally right. It's the law and it is long overdue. It's the law as we have heard from the EPA that under federal regulations of hazardous waste facilities, if the landowner's signature is not on the permit application, the permit must be denied. Period. End of discussion.

For many years, though, the problem has been for so many years the landowner's signature was not on the permit application. So it's about time EPA starts upholding the laws of this country. It's about time. The facts as we now know, and I think really the strongest congratulations for protecting the community go not to the EPA, but to the Gila River Indian Community Tribal government that voted on June 20th unanimously to deny and refuse to sign this permit application and also goes to tribal members who educated other tribal members about this issue.

The reason that had to be done -- and this is very important -- is because EPA failed miserably and it

wasn't just that EPA didn't do its job. EPA, in our opinion, which is based not on, you know, thoughts or ideas or hunches, but actually started when Greenaction did a Freedom of Information Act request at the request of the tribal leader at the Oo'dham Indian Community and we got into EPA's old files on Romic, which proved that, in fact, what we heard earlier from the EPA, which proves that EPA's claim that all violations had been prosecuted simply wasn't true and, in fact, it wasn't until tribal members, particularly the Gila River Alliance for a Clean Environment and Greenaction, started watch-dogging this that EPA had to start prosecuting some violations.

The fact is these violations have gone on in this facility for years, for decades, and I also want to make it clear that this in no way disrespects any of the Romic employees nor an attack on their integrity. I believe they did as good a job as they could.

The fact is Romic as a corporation has a severe problem with complying with the law and protecting the environment and that's based on the facts from their operation here at Gila River as well as their sister facility in East Palo Alto, California, where we saw a pattern and practice of reckless behavior.

So EPA has to take this action because federal law requires. Now that the Tribal Council has acted, you

must turn down the permit. You must act because you have trust responsibility to the Gila River Indian Community and other native nations. You must act to deny the permit because you are bound by the Executive Order on Environmental Justice, but you not only have to deny the permit. You have to do it sometime in our lifetime and hopefully in the next few months, because if you wait a week, sat back and waited for business as usual, we'll be here in ten years waiting for you to actually reach your final permit denial.

We are so concerned about this and that's why some people said why are you going to the hearing tonight since EPA is doing what people want? The reason is there is zero trust. In fact, there is mistrust. For example, we know for a fact from the Tribal Council member and a U.S. EPA official, that U.S. EPA staff told at least one tribal Council member, your own staff and other tribal members that Romic was a well-run facility.

I actually had to invite an EPA staffer who's responsible in part for this process to come to my office so she could see EPA's own inspection reports and she was shocked, and she was upset and when her bosses came to our conference room, she asked them -- and I give her a lot of credit: Why did I have to come to Greenaction to see our agency's inspection reports that showed this was not a

well-run facility?

These inspection reports documented that for years EPA ignored and did not bring to the level of an actual violation, mixing of incompatible waste, storing of incompatible waste, spills, leaks, et cetera. This went on for years.

The inspection reports were not even shown at least to this one Tribal Council member who was shocked.

Why didn't EPA show them to them? We actually demanded and she did a formal request that EPA provide to her so she could share with Council these inspection reports. That began a process of education with more tribal members.

I also want to address the claim that -- a more recent claim that all the violations have been processed.

Well, first of all, many people here were at the December EPA meetings about the risk assessment and things didn't go so well, because Romic had a big accident that sickened dozens of people the week before.

At that meeting in Chandler, the Romic general manager invited the public to come to their facility.

Tribal members actually took him up on that. That day, the next day before the evening hearing at Gila River, we saw violations that Romic admitted were violations. What's outrageous is EPA staff inspectors were on-site at the same time and they either didn't see it or ignored it.

I presented those pictures that night to EPA. I submitted them in writing with copies of the photos. They were never prosecuted, even though Romic's general manager admitted some of these are violations and that was improper storage of hazardous waste.

We also know that when Lori Thomas and I talked to top ranking U.S. EPA asking what are the emissions from Romic, the response was quote, unquote, "What emissions," claiming there were none, a bold-faced total lie. And I bring this out not just to tell a story, but to demand that once and for all, U.S. EPA start upholding the law, upholding the trust responsibility and doing what you're supposed to do in a timely fashion. Not next year, not the year after that, not in 2020, but in 2007.

We want to see a prompt denial. We also demand that U.S. EPA institute permanent denial based on Romic's miserable track record and pattern of violations, both here and as we know at the other facility. We also want to make sure there's a proper cleanup. That includes not just on-site testing, but offsite testing.

For example, we know and you know that the

December incident sickened dozens of workers at Lumber

Products. We know and you know that at least the fencing

between the facilities became contaminated. These were

testing plans for neighboring facilities. That's important

to protect other businesses, the Lone Butte Industrial Park and the Gila River Indian Community. And so we want to see prompt permit denial, new grounds for permit denial in terms of violations that went on for decades, proper cleanup and truthfulness.

Lastly, we do challenge Romic and I do so on the record, and in case there's anybody else in this room or who is going to hear about this from another company who might have this crazy idea that you can ignore tribal sovereignty and the wishes of the Gila River Indian Community and try to reopen this facility, it's shut due to the work of the community and the assertion of tribal sovereignty.

Clean Harbors thought -- the giant tox waste harbor -- they thought they could actually fool us. They told us, oh, we're not talking to -- we're not going to take over this facility and then we found out they were actually in some discussions and tribal members and Greenaction did challenge Clean Harbors and they learned quickly and agreed shortly thereafter to put in writing their agreement not to pursue this facility. And there will be similar challenges to any other polluter who thinks they can do the same, make Gila River a dumping ground in the future.

We want to make sure and challenge Romic that if there were any Romic employees, that those workers are taken care of and they should not pay the price for Romic's

misbehavior, whether that's financial compensation, setting them up with other jobs. They need to be taken care of. So Romic needs to cleanup, pack up and move out and take care of their workers.

And lastly, in closing, I just want to say tribal members and Greenaction and others should never have had to do this. We should never have had to dig into your files and EPA's basement in San Francisco. We never should have had to hear an EPA official say, "What emissions," when EPA knew there were illegal levels of emissions. We never should have had to hear from a Tribal Council member that EPA told her that it was a well-run facility and EPA staff who quickly learned it wasn't.

So I hope this is a lesson to EPA for the future that your resources and time should be spent upholding the law, not helping the polluter violate the law; protecting the environment and not polluters, and again, deny this permit, do it soon and Romic, pack up and move out.

(Applause.)

MS. WONG: At this time I would like to invite Lori Riddle to the podium.

MS. THOMAS-RIDDLE: I hope you don't mind, but I felt quite uncomfortable with my back toward the crowd, today especially. My given name was Lori Thomas. I am the granddaughter of Joseph and Agnes Thomas from District 5.

have relatives in District 3, 4, 5 and 6. I am a descendent of Antonio Azul, a direct descendent, and just like Cheryl, I'm very proud to be O'odham.

In that respect I feel that we as O'odham deserve to live in the health, peace, harmony, just as the way our ancestors had intended for us. My grandfather always said:
I think of your future and I want you to be safe and healthy. That's why I think of these things that I can do for you while I'm still alive.

Now, in regard to my public comment, some people have accused me of being a vindictive person because of my chemical exposure. Some people have accused me of being on some kind of power trip. That's not the case. I actually care about my people. I care about my child. I care about her children. I care that I saw my child from birth -- she was exposed as I was carrying her in my body, and when I saw her growing up with the health problems that she did that should have never been exposed to, that impacted me. That strengthened me.

I also think about -- we just talked to Pasco who had passed away not too long ago and his words were: The industrial park was never put out there to be like this to our people. It was put out there to provide jobs for our people, but yet we only have like less -- maybe even that, 10 percent of our people working in there. I think about

the people that I have made friends with in Chandler and Ahwatukee, these people who have supported me and encouraged me and heard me cry, because of the imminent danger of cancer clusters and physical deformities and miscarriages, you know, and that impacts how hard I work on these projects.

And good for you, if you work in the industrial park in Gila River and you haven't had no health problems, good for you. You're one of the lucky ones. My family and I haven't. Some families are unfortunate, you know. Some people are more susceptible to illnesses and so I can't believe that this Council meeting keeps coming back to my mind, what Cheryl was talking about when they did a report to our Council. And to me, it was like spewing lies to the leaders in our community, telling them this is a well-run facility when in actuality they're doing violations over and over and over and it's like a bad child. You just can't get them to behave.

How long does it go on before you actually punish them for what is -- you know, and even then, the fines cover a two or three year period and that was just basically a slap on the wrist. I see companies outside of the reservation that get fines for half a billion dollars, you know, but I don't know. Maybe I'm just crying racist and it's not right, but if the shoe was on the other foot,

they'd be crying racist, you know.

So it really irks me about the misrepresentation of this company, you know. I feel for you guys. I mean, you guys deserve jobs. Money isn't everything, though. I can remember a lot of times when I did have a full-time job and I'd throw half of my paycheck immediately into the work that I was doing for people I don't know yet, for people who don't even realize I'm helping them in their communities.

Shutting down that waste incinerator, that helped a lot of people. At least we're not breathing dioxin, which was the number one cancer carcinogen today. And with the Romic fining them if they're legitimate, I mean, where's the miscommunication? Where's the breakdown in communication, you know? I can't understand and I can't go to explain this to my children or my future. I can't explain this.

So, I mean, we need to start somewhere and I think the grass roots people have spoken. The leaders have finally taken notice and I think that they're finally realizing that, yeah, there isn't a lot of information that was actually shared with us and if they're finally realizing that we didn't know what questions to ask specifically, but they were just going by the reports they were given.

They're a good company. Keep them in your neighborhood.

They're doing a great job. You guys are doing a good job.

So, you know, I have so much more to say, but I'm

going to give other people opportunities to speak their mind because all I've done is talk and I hope those people one day realize how I'm on their side. Maybe they'll one day realize that they should have been supporting me, you know, and I hope for you the best of health, your family, and you know, people hate me and the majority of you guys know that I have had a death threat recently, but it makes me stronger. And more -- it makes me want to fight more harder because it just proves that there's something to what I'm fighting for.

Somebody's intimidated by me and I'm not even trying to intimidate anybody. So I have strength in me and if there is something that's going to strike me down tomorrow, next year, whenever, I'm ready. At least I can leave this earth knowing that I did the best that I could while I was breathing on this earth. Thank you.

(Applause).

MS. WONG: I would like to invite E.R. Connell to speak to the mic and state your comment and if you could, also just state your name again and what organization you're representing.

MR. CONNELL: Okay. Like Lori, I would like to just face the crowd. My name is E.R. Connell. I go by my initials. I'm not a senior Romic official myself, but I just wanted to briefly reply to some of the comments that

were made earlier this evening very plainly, briefly, succinctly regarding Romic's plans, the closure plan.

Romic is focused on shipping off the waste we received through early August. We have since stopped receiving any hazardous waste on the facility. The company is currently exploring different options and will continue to work cooperatively with the industrial park as well as the Gila River Indian Community to determine the future of the site. That currently has not been determined.

Regarding the September 12 incident, briefly stated, the incident itself was brief. It was a minor fire that occurred within and was contained within a 16-gallon plastic drum. Romic's internal emergency response team, highly trained individuals, quickly and appropriately reacted using strategically positioned portable fire extinguishers.

The emergency response team was easily able to fully extinguish the contained fire within less than two minutes. There were no injuries and no harm to the community. The accident is still under investigation and a subsequent report will be following to the appropriate agencies, including Lone Butte Industrial Compliance, the EPA and the DEQ. Basically, that's all I have to say. Thank you for your time.

MS. WONG: At this time I would like to invite

Teri Johnson to the mic and please state your name and what organization you are representing, ma'am.

MS. JOHNSON: My name is Teri Johnson. I'm representing Greenaction and Children for a Safe Environment. The first thing I want to say is congratulations to Gila River for standing up and doing what's right for your community and now maybe other reservations will realize that they can do the same thing. I have a hard time congratulating the EPA, but I will say doesn't it feel good to do the right thing for a change.

I came from a community in West Phoenix where children have died because of TCE-contaminated wells and that was 20 years ago when 33 kids in our neighborhood died. We are still waiting for a clean-up. The money that was given to our City Council used the money to buy park benches and plant flowers and paint some playground equipment and the children are still dying.

In the meantime, all the homes have been red-lined. So if you try to sell your home you have to tell them you're moving in on top of a hazardous waste site or a Superfund site. So I'm sorry that you lost your job. We lost our children in Maryvale and I lost my 16 year old daughter and so I'm going to keep on doing this until my last breath is gone.

MS. WONG: I would like to invite Teri Lynne
Kisto to the mic and please state your name and the
organization that you are representing.

MS. KISTO: My name is Teri Lynne Kisto and I'm representing Romic. Good evening. My name is Teri Lynne Kisto. I too am a proud community member of the Gila River Indian Community, District 3, and also an employee of Romic. Romic would like to thank you for the opportunity to present these comments tonight.

There have been a lot of negative comments made about Romic in the recent months and Romic has remained silent throughout this time. The company believed it was being respectful, but as a result of the company's silence, the people who make up Romic were feeling let down and unfairly portrayed. This is why the company has asked me to get up and make these comments today.

First, a bit of history. Romic was invited by the community to take over the Southwest Solvent site in 1988. Southwest Solvent failed, leaving the community with an accumulation of waste and a contaminated site. Romic accepted the community's invitation and from 1988 to 1993, worked closely with the community and U.S. EPA to clean up the site.

This work was done at Romic's expense, including properly shipping off the waste in inventory, removal of

contaminated soil, installation of a synthetic liner to prevent future migration of contaminants to ground water and the placement of clean soil above the liner. Romic constructed concrete contaminant structures above the clean fill and then built a modern liquid recycling facility. The total cost to Romic was about two and-a-half million dollars, but it was an investment in the future. Romic made the investment under the belief that the community would back its application for a U.S. EPA hazardous waste facility permit.

Since building their new facility, Romic built a successful, responsible business generating over \$15 million in annual revenue and providing valuable services to the community and the State of Arizona. Romic is proud of its record as the only environmentally friendly recycler in Arizona for materials such as solvents and antifreeze.

Romic has also provided services to the community such as household hazardous waste collection dates in Sacaton and waste management and emergency response services. Romic has been operating for 19 years with a good overall history.

In reference to the recent incident that occurred April 5th, that incident did not and could not have harmed anyone in the community. However, Romic took this incident very seriously and took strong internal action. U.S. EPA,

as well, took strong action resulting in a settlement with Romic where Romic agreed to pay \$77,000 to clean up illegal dump sites in the Gila River Indian Community.

Romic was on track to get its permit application for the site approval by U.S. EPA. Romic went through the extraordinary efforts to ensure its permit application was sound and complete going above and beyond normal requirements. For example, Romic contracted with an independent scientific consultant to conduct a risk assessment of the facility operations, something that is not normally done in a facility such as ours.

Romic incurred substantial additional expenses to complete this permit application, but again, it was seen as an investment. The vote in June by the Council to deny the landowner's signature on Romic's permit application has caused the U.S. EPA to deny the permit. While Romic disagrees with this decision, the company respects the community's wishes. Romic will work cooperatively with the Lone Butte Industrial Park and community leaders to explore options for the site.

Romic wishes to thank its many conscientious and loyal employees, including several community members. Their efforts were the reason for our success. It is unfortunate that at this time we cannot continue to provide gainful employment for them and their families. Going forward as

always, Romic remains committed to doing the right thing and
will continue to meet its obligations. Thank you.

(Applause).

MS. WONG: At this time I would like to invite Bill Dixon to the mic and please state your name and any affiliation or organization.

MR. DIXON: My name is Bill Dixon and I work for Romic Environmental. I had the privilege to be there prior to Romic coming in and taking over Southwest Solvents. I got to see the plant work done to prepare the whole thing. It was quite extensive and when Romic took over, they trained the personnel, all its employees on various things and every year we got refresher courses on all the items that was required of us to operate safely and they gave us yearly physicals to maintain the value, the level of health that we keep.

This has been done -- I've been working there for 19 years. By the time it's all said and done, it will be 19 years and a little bit more. I had hoped to retire there, but it doesn't seem like I'm going to do that, but that's besides the point. Irregardless of what anybody says, I have seen EPA come into this facility there and they have gone through what I thought was knitpicking to -- when they do their inspections. The DEQ came on board. They started. They were always there, every time I pulled in there --

because I was the driver. I pulled in there and somebody would be there. Sometimes they'd question me. Sometimes they won't. But irregardless, there was always somebody roaming around in there checking.

Yes, there were incidents, incidents that occurred in this facility, but because of the training that was given to the employees, they were able to maintain control and contain it and know how to react and respond to that emergency.

And so yes, I'm a member of the Gila River Indian Community. I come from District 3 right now. And sad to say, I don't know. I have no idea how long I'm going to live. People die. The war has killed a lot of people. I may live another ten years. I may not live till tomorrow. Who knows. There's accidents. There's shootings. There's killings, but in what I saw what Romic did, tried to do was its best and what it gave to its employees. So with that, I thank you all.

(Applause).

MS. WONG: I would like to invite Mike P. Harris to the mic and please state any organizations you are representing.

MR. HARRIS: My name is Mike P. Harris. I've been fortunate enough to be retired for several years. I'm here basically representing the general public. While this

hearing is predominantly a formality based on Gila River

Indian Community's decision not to sign as a landowner, I

wish to make several points.

First and foremost, Romic cleaned up the facility when they moved in. That facility is cleaner now than when Romic got there. Okay. Everybody should be very clear of that fact. It is cleaner now than when Romic got there.

Gila River Indian Community within the lease agreed to sign as a landowner. Okay.

Now EPA has no choice but to deny the permit based on the refusal to sign and that's Gila River's prerogative, but Gila River should realize they're under a huge business liability. Okay. It's going to cost them money. That may be their choice, okay, but they signed that lease saying they would sign as landlord. So they are in default of their own lease agreement.

Please note, Romic's a major recycling facility. Its closure is going to end up as a net detriment to the environment and our natural resources. It is a shame a vocal minority has once again succeeded in raising false allegations and hysteria, to close a wonderful facility which was saving our precious natural resources through recycling and hence serving as a net protector of our environment. It should also be noted that the facility was built state of the art. They went well beyond the

regulations on what was mentioned. They put liners underneath the containment areas.

I'm not sure where it's going to go. The lease does extend for a while longer, but I would encourage the facility to keep operating. Now, it can't operate with hazardous waste, but they can continue to recycle under their lease.

Another fact that should be noted is that the closure of Romic has not solved any of the problems other than to move it somewhere else. That waste is now going to be shipped to another facility which is not as good as Romic. That should be very clear to people. All you're doing is moving a problem instead, at least what you consider a problem. It's going to go to another facility that is not as good as Romic.

Lastly, I'd like to thank EPA for performing admirably in a very difficult public arena and encourage them through education in regards to relative hazards to the public that they are exposed to, including those in their own homes. I wish to succinctly express my thanks to Patrick Wilson, a great and well-spoken educator, toxicologist for his efforts in this regard at the December 12 public meeting. Thank you.

(Applause).

MS. WONG: I would like to invite Alan Rybarchyk

to the mic and please state any organization that you are representing and your name again.

MR. RYBARCHYK: My name is Alan A-L-A-N
Rybarchyk, R-Y-B-A-R-C-H-Y-K. In Bohemian it means little
fisherman. My Ojibwa name is Sleeping Bear, spelled
B-A-R-E. (Laughing).

At our first public meeting there was a lot of criticism about the inadequate notice and insufficient facility. I'm glad, Cheryl, that those shortcomings have been corrected. This is a lovely facility and we have plenty of notice and that was a well-prepared brochure. Thank you for that.

Romic Environmental Health and Safety Specialist, Mr. E.R. Connell is right. Facilities like Romic are necessary. So is oversight. Both companies like Romic and the EPA need to raise the bar more than one notch to assure that such facilities do, in fact, protect both human health and the environment as necessary and only right.

I wish to thank the Gila River Community for stepping up to the plate and unanimously voting to not sign the permit application. I also want to go on record that the EPA 9th Region has the most beautiful, personable and professional ladies, including our court reporter. I would also like to thank Officer McIlvene in the rear, one of Chandler's finest, for protecting and serving our community.

Thank you very much.

(Applause).

MS. WONG: I would like to invite Delores

Martinez to the mic and please again state any organization

you are representing and your name again.

MS. MARTINEZ: Good evening and thank you for allowing me to share my thoughts with the community here. I want to thank every one of you that came to share their support of this Gila River Alliance for a Clean Environment and all the other groups, families and relatives of victims of contamination in our community. I made a few notes because it's kind of hard for me to concentrate with so much going on and so much misinformation being perpetrated by obviously well-meaning employees of Romic.

Although the EPA has complied with documentation denial of the permit, they musn't allow agencies ever to enable toxic waste perpetrators to continue to contaminate our community. So although you all did the right thing finally in denying the permit, I don't even see why there should be any continued discussion about this issue.

And then I wanted to make a comment on the fines disbursal. You said that the fines that were brought in from Romic's violations, that they were disbursed for emergency equipment. Emergency equipment for what? For future hazardous waste catastrophes? Why would you need

more emergency equipment? You know, the tribes bring in a lot of revenue from the casinos. They're perfectly able to handle that themselves. I think that the fines should be committed to the local -- the local community that lives there, the many families that live there. They might not be in District 2 or 3 or where all the other employees might live, but the actual families that live there.

I happen to know them personally. Children play in those areas, you know, and they might dump some topsoil over the contamination like they did with Aerodyne, in the Aerodyne era, and might think that they had covered up the contamination, but eventually it rubs away, especially with the casino being brought up over there at that particular site there. So I think that's something to look at.

Above all else, I don't think that liability would be the first and foremost concern for anybody, whether it's Romic or EPA. My goodness, you guys have liability issues here. Romic likes to state that oh, we signed a permit and so the tribe is responsible to them for, you know, ending the permit's time. Well, you know what? That was probably contingent upon complying with the law.

Had Romic been in compliance with their own guidelines and with their own laws of the EPA and federal government, perhaps you guys would still be there. Perhaps you need to look for some other employment. You guys do

1 seem like loyal employees. I'm sure there's another corporation somewhere that would love to have you.

Finally, the fact that when I asked EPA for the responsible oversight agency that would govern over the regional EPA, unfortunately nobody can provide it to me. You guys don't even have it. Standard operating procedure, you should always know who your higher-ups are. there's something that you can't handle? Why not just call your supervisors, you know, the administration. You haven't even been able to provide it to me.

As graciously as you came up to me and let me know, gee, I don't have it just yet, why don't you? don't know who your supervisors are? I don't understand That's just standard operating procedure and just overall, just watch your backs. There's liability here. think it's unfortunate that many of the community members have had to endure threats upon their lives, endure financial hardships, sacrifice time from their employment and forget that. What about the families that have had to sacrifice a level, a standard of living, a standard of living, you know.

I mean, I've gone to homes in the community and it hurts me to say this, but sometimes I'm afraid to wash my hands there. When I turn that water faucet on, to think that the water is the most sacred element that we rely upon

to survive on this planet, regardless of race, regardless of status, regardless of economics -- that you want to think that it's okay for your company to contaminate the essence of life on this planet is unforgivable. And I hope that tonight that you will have listened to Lori and all the folks that support Gila River Alliance for a Clean Environment.

In our presence is someone so amazing in her dedication and her humble manner, in her commitment and her sacrifice to all of us, each and every one of us, that I'm -- I can't find the words to say that I'm honored to be in her presence and in the presence of Mr. Angel and all the folks from Greenaction and all the folks that hear our struggle on behalf of the environment, for all of you, even those of you that are employed by Romic. You may not even realize it yet.

So I thank you for allowing me to share these thoughts on these issues and we will continue to struggle with or without some of you. Hopefully with you. We will think more highly of you when you finally do come around. Thank you very much.

(Applause).

MS. WONG: I would like to invite David Van Druff to the mic and please state any organizations you are representing.

MR. VAN DRUFF: Good evening. My name is David
Van Druff. I'm representing myself, but I'm also a member
of the Gila River Alliance for a Clean Environment. I am,
despite the last name, a member of the Gila River Indian
Community and I live on the same street that Romic does.
And it's true, all the things that they've been saying about
the toxic waste and the lack of action from government
entities both within and without the BIA, even our own
tribal leadership, so-called tribal leadership.

I work in the education field so I know what I'm talking about. I've worked in public school systems, private school systems, BIA school systems, and I've seen the high end and the low end of it and what you're witnessing here tonight is historic because the Gila River Indian Community has never done this before. They've never stood up on their own two feet and said no, that is our land. I hate to put it that way, but we have made a decision of what we're going to do with our lands. That's very important in this issue called sovereignty of which many, many people have a lot of misconceptions and they don't fully understand yet.

I want to thank Lori for her hard work. I've known her for many, many years and have been through a lot of these different types of meetings. I want to thank

Mr. Angel for taking his time to come out here. I want to

thank the organizations and the people that are involved
with the organizations from all levels, because you are the
ones that made the difference.

The Tribal Council and Governor, basically I don't believe -- they became educated, but it was because of you, because of what you did, because you were pulling on their coat tails or pulling on their ears, saying look, listen, the people are speaking. One last thing, there's a game that's been played for quite a long time in Indian country and it's called ignore it and hope it goes away.

Well, this time it hasn't gone away. Thank you very much. (Applause.)

MS. WONG: I would like to invite Wind River Joaquim to the mic. Please state your name and your position again. So we have both.

WIND RIVER JOAQUIM: Hi. My name is Wind River Joaquim. I am Tohono Akimel O'odham and I represent the Gila River Alliance for a Clean Environment and I just want to say I'm against the people who want to keep Romic here. Romic's waste is putting my people and my homeland in danger and Romic doesn't belong here and I don't want it on my land and I think they need to deny the permit.

(Applause).

PEYOTE DAWN JOAQUIM: Good evening. My name is Peyote Dawn Joaquim. I'm Tohono Akimel O'odham residing on

the Gila River Indian Community only about a half a mile from the Romic facility. I want to voice my opinion representing Gila River Alliance for a Clean Environment. It's clear that Romic is not wanted here on my homeland. That is what I would like to see for the future of this community. It's about time that foreigners take responsibility for hazardous waste and practically dumping on sacred land.

With respect to some comments expressed earlier, I ask you to please respect the voices of the original landlords of this country. Lastly, thank you for allowing me to speak up on behalf of my people and the land I as O'odham was taught to value.

(Applause).

CHERYL JOAQUIM: Good evening. My name is Cheryl Joaquim and I am a resident of Gila River. I represent myself as a mother and grandmother and an O'odham woman. Again, I'm not going to take up too much time because I understand how the process goes and once again, you know, it's just amazing to me like many of the people had stated that, you know, the decision has been made. The voice has been spoken, not only by my people, but the rest of the people within the community who have a concern for human life.

And with that, that is the highest standard or

highest entity I could look at because we are all human beings, but we have one creator. We have one environment. We have air. We have water, and the way I looked at it, for too long we have taken these things for granted, even our own people -- I stand and talk about my own people -- have taken that for granted and I myself am quite ashamed when I see some of our tribal leaders and people that are in authority to make those changes and yet they stand idly by and think it doesn't concern them because they're not there.

They don't live there, but in the end it concerns all of us as a human family and that's all I would like to say and I'd like to thank all of you that have come to support us and all the people that have said in our positive support this evening and just for the record, myself as a land owner and original inhabitant of this area, I deny also the permit. Thank you.

(Applause).

MS. WONG: I would like to invite Haley Ritter to the mic. Please state the organization that you represent.

MS. RITTER: My name is Haley Ritter, H-A-L-E-Y, last name R-I-T-T-E-R. And I'm here tonight to -- I don't represent any group other than myself. I'm here tonight to express my appreciation, respect and support of the decision to deny Romic's permit. I've been going through this struggle with Lori and all the wonderful people of the Gila

River Indian Community and I've seen the turmoil this company all the way back to Southwest Solvents has caused on this land and I find it a disgrace that like Delores and other members of the community have pointed out, that we are taking this land for granted. Even producing chemicals like this in the first place just don't make sense to me, you know.

We have all the things we need without creating things in mad scientist labs to destroy our planet. I think that it's ridiculous and I'd like -- and I'm very glad that this decision has been made because now we can close down the facility like this and tell the world -- send the world a message that says we don't need these chemicals in the first place. Yes, they exist now, but they need to be -- we need to wean ourselves off of our addictions to chemicals and hazardous waste.

I also believe that regardless of what happens, well, from this point on -- this decision is like another gentleman said -- a huge landmark in history, and I believe at this point on, the EPA needs to step in and do what I believe is called RIO project where they basically just set up the existing space as a Super Fund site and just get it cleaned up. Stop allowing companies like this to come in and just destroy the land and upset the community.

I think that with slow painful process, we can

get this land cleaned up and it's very important to me and I think to many members of the community here that this happens. And hopefully, like I said, send a message to the world that we don't need to have these kinds of chemicals in our world anymore. To take advantage of our water and our resources is just not necessary. We hope that together as a community we can support each other and realize that we have everything we need without mad scientists. Thank you very much.

(Applause).

MS. WONG: I would like to invite Scott Long to the mic. Please state your organization, if any, you're representing and your name again.

MR. LONG: My name is Scott Long. I'm here representing myself in the political tradition of the old Democratic -- progressive Democratic party of Hubert Humphrey, Walter Mondale and Paul Wellstone and I've lived in Arizona for many years and it's very difficult for me to get adjusted to how politics and policies are enacted out here, but days like today I'm getting watching this process take place and different groups involved and the roles that they play, give me hope that the things that I grew up loving and believing in about our nation and our society and our ideals are beginning to be applied here and again, thanks to folks like Lori Riddle taking the lead.

Anyway, the denial of this permit is sort of a victory of due process and of responsibility, two values that have been neglected for so long. 1988 Romic came out here. Romic had an opportunity -- there is an opportunity to recycle hazardous waste. I mean, in the context of eliminating chemicals and trying to create a society where we don't need chemicals, there is an opportunity for a company to make some money and help making that dream come true and benefitting the community.

And so they were given a temporary permit and they started working. Then, accident, accident, accident, 18 years, an 18 year temporary permit. I only became personally aware of this issue within the last year. Since I became aware of this issue, there have been three or four incidents where there have been toxins that have been released into the environment. Is that responsibility? Is that taking the opportunity to solve a problem? It just seems like recklessness that they have been year after year after year. Why is this allowed to go on?

There is someone who came up here sort of representing the status quo just a little bit ago who was talking about, well, they're going to have to pay for it economically. There's going to be lawsuits and what's going to happen. This is just going to go somewhere else. This problem isn't going to go away.

It's that type of attitude -- and that's what it is is an attitude -- that contains the status quo and keeps fear going and keeps people thinking oh, no. But thanks to people like Lori Riddle and people and organizations like Greenaction to back her up, that you know, we don't have to listen to that because those are the cowards in the system.

(Applause).

And so anyway, Romic had its chance and this process and I would thank the EPA being pushed on by again by GRACE and Greenaction and the courage of the Gila River Indian Community to look -- use the true leadership that is so true about Native Americans of placing the values of people and health over economics and growth.

The Gila River Indian people have set a great example for those of us in Phoenix and the rest of the community and then there's the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. Back when they were founded in 1972, it was done by a lot of idealistic people in the federal government to help preserve the environment of our country and it was funded. It was given a vision and a mission.

Over the course of time, because the values of our culture have gone into economics and growth, the power of the EPA to actually fulfill this vision got washed out, but again, thanks to the grass roots efforts of GRACE and one woman on a crusade and an awareness organization out in

San Francisco willing to back her up and help spread that awareness and spread the word, that vision can be restored to the due process of what the EPA was established for.

So hopefully this will begin to be a template or at least set a precedence for not only this, but for all other types of situations involving the environment, chemical facilities and such that the EPA can sort of fight the trend of economics and growth and actually place the values of people in the environment. And again, Greenaction, the fact that there are advocacy groups.

Sometimes we roll our eyes when we get phone calls or letters in the mail asking for money from all of these groups and I've even, you know, questioned the validity of that, but it is groups and it is those commitments that we make and those phone calls and checks we send for \$5 to groups like Greenaction that give them the teeth and power so they can support the grass roots efforts of people like Lori Riddle. So I'm thankful for them and it makes me think about the next time I get one of those envelopes in the mail.

Then also, GRACE -- the Gila River Association for a Clean Environment -- one woman who felt like she was just fighting the tides, the fact that she had a vision by herself -- and this is what restores my faith in the American dream -- that one person seeing an injustice being

done and believing in it and that's the whole thing. If you believe in something, you make the commitment no matter what shit gets thrown at you, that she kept going and going and going because she believed in it and she wasn't going to let anything deter her.

So again, I think this tonight and this process is a victory for our community values and, you know, the revival of our society and our people. And anyway, I'm proud to be here. Thank you.

(Applause).

MS. WONG: I have read all the names of those individuals who signed up to make a comment. At this time if there is anyone present today who would like to make a comment that has not yet spoken, please raise their hand so I can pass the mic to you. Okay. So I will pass the mic back to Arlene to close out the public hearing.

MS. KABEI: Seeing that there are no more speakers for this evening, it is now 8:40 and this concludes our public hearing tonight. Thank you for all of your attendance and your participation and safe journey home.

MS. NELSON: I just wanted to respond to the one comment about who to talk to in our headquarters office.

His name is Matt M-A-T-T. Last name is Hale, H-A-L-E. He's with U.S. EPA in Washington, D.C. His title is Director,

Office of Solid Waste. And I don't have access to his phone
