REGION 8 TRIBAL ANNUAL COMPLIANCE REPORT FOR CALENDAR YEAR 2012

I. Introduction

Section 1414(c)(3)(B) of the amended Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA) requires the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to prepare and make available to the public an annual report on violations of the National Primary Drinking Water Regulations by public water systems (PWSs) on Tribal Lands each year. This report includes violations pertaining to: 1) maximum contaminant levels, 2) maximum residual disinfectant level, 3) treatment requirements, 4) monitoring requirements determined to be significant by the Administrator, and 5) significant consumer confidence report requirements.

EPA Region 8 has primary enforcement authority in Indian Country throughout Region 8 states and thus prepared this annual compliance report. This report is intended to summarize and identify PWSs on Tribal Lands within EPA Region 8 that have been identified as having violations in categories 1-5 above during the calendar year 2012. The source of the information contained in this report is the SDWIS/State database maintained by the EPA Region 8 Tribal Direct Implementation Program.

II. The Drinking Water Program: An Overview

The EPA established the Public Water System Supervision (PWSS) Program under the authority of the 1974 Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA). Under the SDWA and the 1986 Amendments, EPA sets national limits on contaminant levels in drinking water to ensure that the water is safe for human consumption. These limits are known as Maximum Contaminant Levels (MCLs) and Maximum Residual Disinfectant Levels (MRDLs). For some regulations, EPA establishes treatment techniques (TT) in lieu of an MCL to control unacceptable levels of contaminants in water. For example, treatment techniques have been established for viruses, some bacteria, and turbidity. The Agency also regulates how often public water systems monitor their water for contaminants and report the monitoring results to the states or EPA. Generally, the larger the population served by the water system, the more frequent the monitoring and reporting (M/R) requirements. In addition, EPA requires PWSs to monitor for unregulated contaminants to provide data for future regulatory development. Finally, EPA requires PWSs to notify their consumers when they have violated these regulations. The 1996 Amendments to the SDWA require consumer notification to include clear and understandable explanation of the nature of the violation, its potential adverse health effects; steps that the PWS is undertaking to correct the violation and the possibility of alternative water supplies during the violation. The SDWA applies to the 50 states, the District of Columbia, Indian Lands, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, American Samoa, Guam, and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands.

The SDWA allows states and territories to seek EPA approval to administer their own PWSS Programs. The authority to run a PWSS Program is called primacy. For a state to receive primacy, EPA must determine that the state meets certain requirements laid out in the SDWA and the regulations, including the adoption of drinking water regulations that are at least as stringent as the Federal regulations and a demonstration that they can enforce

the program requirements. Of the 56 states and territories, all but Wyoming and the District of Columbia have primacy. The EPA Regional Offices administer the PWSS Programs within these two jurisdictions.

The 1986 SDWA Amendments gave Indian Tribes the right to apply for and receive primacy. EPA currently administers PWSS Programs on all Tribal Lands except the Navajo Nation, which was granted primacy in 2000.

III. Public Water System

A Public Water System (PWS) is defined as a system that provides water via piping or other constructed conveyances for human consumption to at least 15 service connections or serves an average of at least 25 people for at least 60 days each year. There are three types of PWSs. PWSs can be community (such as towns), nontransient noncommunity (such as schools or factories on independent water sources), or transient noncommunity systems (such as rest stops or parks). For this report, the use of the acronym "PWS" means systems of all types unless specified in greater detail.

IV. Variances and Exemptions

During calendar year 2012, EPA Region 8 did not allow variances or exemptions for Tribal Land public water systems.

V. Monitoring

A PWS is required to monitor and verify that the levels of contaminants present in the water do not exceed the MCL. If a PWS fails to have its water tested as required or fails to report test results correctly to the primacy agent, a monitoring violation occurs. For this report, significant monitoring violations are generally defined as any significant monitoring violation that occurred during the calendar year of the report. A significant monitoring violation, with rare exception, occurs when no samples were taken or no results were reported during a compliance period.

VI. Consumer Notification

Every Community Water System is required to deliver to its customers an annual Consumer Confidence Report. This report is to include some educational material, and will provide information on the source water, the levels of any detected contaminants, and compliance with drinking water regulations. For this report, a significant consumer notification violation occurred if a community water system completely failed to provide its customers the required annual report.

VII. Obtaining a Copy of the 2012 Public Water Systems Report

IX. Findings and Conclusions

Bacteriological Contaminants

- There were a total of 23 monitoring/reporting violations of the total coliform rule (TCR) by 18 public water systems out of a total of approximately 135 Tribal water systems (see Appendix A).
- There were a total of 10 monthly maximum contaminant level (MCL) violations of the total coliform rule by 9 public water systems (see Appendix B).

Surface Water Treatment Rules / Disinfection Byproducts Rule

- There were 17 monitoring/ reporting violations of the surface water treatment rule by 5 public water systems (see Appendix C).
- There were 10 treatment technique violations of the surface water treatment rule by 4 public water systems (see Appendix C).
- There were 11 monitoring/reporting violations for Disinfection Byproducts (DBP) by 8 public water system (see Appendix D).

- There were 9 MCL violations of the DBP Rule by 3 public water systems (see Appendix D).
- There were 4 treatment technique violations of the DBP Rule by 1 public water system (see Appendix D).

Chemical Contaminants (IOC, VOC, SOC, NO3, and rads)

- There were 3 monitoring/reporting violations for chemical contaminants (IOC, VOC, SOC, NO₃, and rads) by 3 public water systems (see Appendix E).
- There was 1 maximum contaminant level (MCL) violation for chemical contaminants by 1 public water system (see Appendix E).

Lead and Copper Rule

 There were 9 monitoring/reporting violations for the lead and copper rule (PbCu) by 8 public water systems (see Appendix F).

Ground Water Rule

- There was 1 monitoring/reporting violation for the ground water rule (GWR) by 1 public water system (see Appendix G).
- There were 4 treatment technique violations for the GWR by 3 public water system (see Appendix G).

Consumer Confidence Report

There was 1 public water system that failed to submit its Consumer Confidence Report (CCR) for calendar year 2011 during 2012 (see Appendix H).

X. 2012 Annual Compliance Report Summary
